



DRS Vision Statement

The Division of Rehabilitative Services provides opportunities for people with disabilities to pursue career pathways, skills development and financial independence through employment.



VR CONTINUUM OF SERVICES

- · Earliest set of services for potentially eligible or eligible students with disabilities
- · Short term in nature to help identify career interests

- Specific set of five required activities provided directly to students with disabilities under pre-employment transition services
- States must reserve a minimum of 15 percent of Federal allotment to provide Pre-employment transition services
- Available for eligible students & youth with disabilities through an IPE
- Help further develop and pursue career interests through post-secondary education, vocational training, job search, placement, retention, follow-up and follow-along services
 - Typically provided once <u>eligible students & youth with disabilities</u> have further identified, developed, and pursued career interests, offered through transition services, and are pursuing specific employment outcomes through an IPE
 - Assist in preparing for, securing, retaining, advancing in or regaining an employment outcome

AND REHABILITATIVE SERVICES

Target Population

- Pre-employment transition services are provided statewide to all who meet the definition of a "student with a disability" who may need such services and are either:
 - Potentially eligible for vocational rehabilitation services (i.e., all students with disabilities, including those who have not applied or been determined eligible for vocational rehabilitation services), or
 - ✓ <u>Eligible</u> for vocational rehabilitation services



| The 5 Pre-ETS | Supports SWDs to |
|--|--|
| 1. Job Exploration Counseling (JEC) | Learn about career pathways, in-demand industries and occupations, the labor market and their career interests |
| 2. Work-based Learning (WBL) | Further explore the world of work and various occupations and career pathways and have opportunities to practice and improve workplace skills |
| 3. Counseling on Postsecondary Education/Training Options (CPSET) | Develop awareness of the range of postsecondary educational and occupational training opportunities and understand and take a career pathways approach to employment |
| 4. Workplace Readiness Training (WRT) | Develop independent living skills and employers commonly seek from most employees |
| 5. Instruction in Self-Advocacy (ISA) | Develop communication, decision-making; and self-determination skills |

Counseling on Postsecondary Education and Training Programs Service Examples

- Provide information and guidance on the variety of postsecondary education and training opportunities
- Support understanding of academic accommodations and services
- Promote use of executive functioning skills
- Connect to postsecondary education/training resources/services/websites
- Identify financial aid options; help complete financial aid applications
- Educate about admission requirements









Workplace Readiness Training Service Examples

- Training in soft skills:
 - Effective and professional communication
 - Decision making and conflict resolution
 - Teamwork
- Training in job-seeking skills
- Training in independent living skills, such as:
 - Good hygiene and appropriate dress;
 - Financial literacy;
 - Time management;
 - Using transportation;
 - Appropriate behavior







Instruction in Self-Advocacy Service Examples

- Teach students how to:
 - Take responsibility to plan their lives and pursue their interests
 - Become self-aware
 - Disclose their disability
 - Request accommodations
 - Effectively expressing wants and needs
 - Accept feedback
 - Understand their rights and responsibilities
 - Become self-determined
 - Set goals
 - Problem solve





Examples of Services Available to Potentially Eligible (PE) Students with Disabilities

(Not an exhaustive list)

- Interest inventories
- Review of labor market information
- Exploration of career pathways
- Informational interviews
- Job shadowing
- Work site tours
- Postsecondary education/training campus tours
- Education in the financial aid process
- Development of soft skills, such as: time management, organization and planning, problem solving, appropriate and effective communication, etc...
- · Development of independent living skills
- Financial literacy training
- Teaching how to request accommodations
- · Teaching rights and responsibilities
- Teaching employer expectations
- · Development of self-advocacy skills
- Education about transportation options and general travel training
- Career Pathways for Individuals with Disabilities academies



Transition Services

- Transition services are the next set of services on the continuum of VR services available to <u>eligible</u> students and youth with disabilities to provide further development and pursuit of career interests with:
 - Postsecondary education
 - Vocational Training
 - Job-seeking and job-keeping services



Employment-Related Services

- Employment-related services are the next and final phase in the continuum of VR services for eligible students and youth with disabilities.
- Typically provided once <u>eligible</u> students and youth have further developed their career interests through transition services and are now pursuing a specific employment outcome.
 - In-House Job Placement Services
 - Supported Employment
 - Customized Employment
